



ACCESS RESTRICTIONS — JUNE 2020



WEST BANK BARRIER

A series of walls, fences and other obstacles that control Palestinian movement. Palestinian access to land and communities located behind the Barrier is subject to a set of Israeli requirements, including special permits. In its 2004 Advisory Opinion, the International Court of Justice (ICJ) established that the sections of the Barrier which run inside the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, together with the associated gate and permit regime, violate Israel's obligations under international law.



THE PERMIT REQUIREMENT



Most Palestinians are required to obtain various types of permits to access areas behind the Barrier, including East Jerusalem, as well as settlement areas. Agaba village - Aids holding their olive harvest permits. ©Photo by OCHA

MOVEMENT OBSTACLES



A policy of physical barriers, permit requirements and other administrative restrictions are used to control Palestinian pedestrian and vehicular movement.



A checkpoint staffed on an occasional basis.



A tall structure used to observe/monitor vehicular and/or pedestrian movement.



A mound of rubble, dirt and/or rocks used to obstruct vehicle access.



Road used exclusively by Palestinians running beneath the Barrier and/or a restricted road for Israeli use.



A series of 1 cubic metre concrete blocks used to obstruct vehicle access.



A ditch used to prevent vehicles from crossing.




A metal barrier on a road, which is opened and closed depending on the circumstances.



A continuous fence along a road used primarily by Israeli settlers, which limits vehicular and pedestrian access to it by Palestinians.



A series of earthmounds along a road used primarily by settlers, which limits vehicular and pedestrian access to it by Palestinians.



WEST BANK BARRIER

- Constructed

CLOSED AND RESTRICTED AREAS

- Israeli military base (Access is prohibited)
- Israeli firing zone and Jordan Valley military buffer zone (Access is prohibited)
- East Jerusalem (based on Israel's unilateral annexation) (Palestinians from other parts of the oPt generally require permits to enter)
- Israeli Nature Reserve (Land used to restrict access)

ISRAELI SETTLEMENTS

- Built-up area, outer limit and municipal area
- Settlement within a Palestinian residential area
- Land cultivated by settlers

ISRAELI-PALESTINIAN INTERIM AGREEMENTS


- Area A: Extensive civil and security powers by the Palestinian Authority*
- Area B: Partial civil and security powers by the Palestinian Authority
- Area C: Full Israeli control over security, planning and construction
- H1, H2 (Hebron): Full Israeli control over security, planning and construction
- Intended nature reserve: Full Israeli control over security, planning and construction

PALESTINIAN COMMUNITIES

- Governorate capital
- Governorate boundary
- Built-up area
- Population ranges: <1,000 residents, 1,000-10,000 residents, >10,000 residents
- Depopulated community

EAST JERUSALEM

Around 345,000 Palestinians currently reside in East Jerusalem, in addition to over 220,000 Israeli settlers. Approximately 4.7 million Palestinians from the remainder of the occupied Palestinian territory (oPt) are prohibited from residing in East Jerusalem and, with certain age exceptions, cannot enter the city without Israeli-issued permits, which are difficult to obtain. Those who obtain permits can only use three of the 13 checkpoints along the Barrier.

ISRAELI SETTLERS


633,600 Israeli settlers live in 250 settlements established in contravention of international law (including settlement outposts) in the West Bank, including East Jerusalem.

HEBRON H2
